

Study Monitoring and residence permits

From June 1, 2013, the Dutch Immigration Service (IND) has implemented the Modern Migration Policy Act (MoMi).

To continue your studies in the Netherlands, students in possession of a residence permit for study are expected to maintain sufficient progress toward a degree. You should earn at least 50% of the credits required per academic year. The educational institution checks this at the end of each academic year. If you do not meet this standard, Rotterdam University of Applied Sciences has the obligation to report this to the IND and your residence permit may be withdrawn.

If the insufficiency of credits is caused by certain personal circumstances, then it may be possible to maintain your residence permit. Students who have these personal circumstances can file an objection. The school will determine whether the objection is founded.

The implementation of the law is carried out by the Student Service Center in cooperation with the schools of Rotterdam University of Applied Sciences.

Students with a residence permit for study will receive a letter from the Student Service Center with further information about the Modern Migration Policy Act (MoMi). The student must agree in writing with this new policy act. A declaration form will be provided with the letter and must be signed and returned by the student to the Student Service Center.
